ISSUES IN PAKISTAN ECONOMY

UR guest speaker Dr Rafiq Ahmed Khan, Dean, Dadabhoy Institute of Management & Technology addressed the students of Greenwich University on the topic of "ISSUES IN PAKISTAN ECONOMY".



 Approximately 80% of our GDP is spent on servicing the domestic and foreign debts and our highly lopsided expenditure on defence which unfortunately leaves very little to spend on social sectors "Health, Education and necessary infrastructure".

The speaker suggested that inspite of our quite impressive record of the past few years in managing the macroeconomy of the country, we have very serious problems facing us in the face and these need to be handled by our economic managers in a very cautious manner, and also as they very well



Among the many things which he spoke about three can be highlighted and they are:

Inflation: technically defined as increase in the general price level but commonly referred to as PUBLIC ENEMY NUMBER ONE because it



reduces the purchasing power of two sections of the society, one the salaried class and two, the low income group. Unfortunately, in Pakistan we have been experiencing very high rate of inflation these past few years which is hurting the majority of the population of the country.

People living below the poverty line which is technically defined as a unit earning less than 1 US\$ per

day. Officially, according to State Bank of Pakistan, the number of people living below the poverty line is approximately 30% of the population, whereas according to the opposition and the reality on the ground it is closer to 40%. This belittles all the tall claims made by the President and Prime Minister downward every now and then.


Spiritual rebirth of Pakistan After October Earthquake

AKISTAN has experienced, one of its worst ever earthquakes in recorded history. The earthquake, which struck Islamabad, Muzzafarabad, Azad Kashmir and many other cities and villages in Pakistan, measured a magnitude of 7.6 on the Richter scale, when it occurred at 8:50am PST on Saturday the 8th of October 2005. This South Asia Earthquake is called so because its impact was also felt in parts of Afghanistan and India, but the brunt of the quake was taken by Pakistan because of the epicenter being close to Islamabad. The aftermath has been disastrous for all: more than 75000 have been killed and hundreds of thousands have been left homeless. This earthquake has struck the poorest

of the country and has made them vulnerable victims to the severe winter that approaches.

Imagine yourself in a state like those people, with no food, water or shelter, and no parents to look after or care for you. You are surrounded by the destroyed ambience, which consists of rubble and mud. The winter is approaching and you will become victim to the biting cold of the Himalayas. If the earthquake has destroyed your life, having no shelter or food is sure death in the winter.

Greenwich University has done a lot to help the earthquake victims. Many students volunteered to go and







N a major policy shift, the Academic Council of Greenwich University has decided to diversify its academic programs.

Before joining Greenwich University, Prof Dr Rafat Karim was the Chairman of the English Department of Karachi University, where he had the distinc-



In pursuance of this decision, the Faculty of Arts is taking measures to introduce a three-year B.A. Honours, and a two-year Masters programme in English, effective from the new academic session in December 2005.

Simultaneously, Greenwich University is also offering M.Phil. and Ph.D. degrees in English.

All these programmes are being offered under the direct supervision of Prof Dr Rafat Karim, Dean of the Faculty of Arts. He is one of the senior most Professors of English in the country. He is a Shakespearean scholar of international reputation, and has had the honour of representing Pakistan at international conferences across the world.

tion of producing the very first Ph.D. in English in the history of Karachi University.

He is also the President of the Shakespeare Association of Pakistan, as well as a member of the International Shakespeare Association, based in Stratford-upon-Ayon (U.K.).

It may be pointed out that Greenwich University is the first university in the private sector to be offering so many programmes in English – B.A. Honours, M.A., M.Phil, and Ph.D.

The degrees will have international creditability, as the courses are at par with international standards, and the faculty comprises Ph.D.s, and Masters from the reputed British, American, and Pakistani universities.

Launching Of Faculty Of Social Sciences

HE departments created under the Faculty of Social Science are of great importance in addressing the non-traditional and modern knowledge areas preparing students for the Masters Degrees in the areas of:

Women Studies, Development Studies, NGO Development Studies, Community-Oriented Policing Studies, Rural Sociology, Social Work and Development Economics.

Professor Dr. Rahat Alam, Dean, Faculty of Social Sciences, a Ph.D. in English, a Doctorate in Management Sciences and an ISO 9000 Lead Auditor Certification is heading these departments. He has about 25 years of post doctoral experience in teaching and research. It is hoped that the Faculty of Social Sciences will succeed with flying colours under him.

The unique feature of these programs is that M.Sc. Social Science degree can lead the desirous students to MS/M.Phil to Ph.D. in relevant social Science disciplines. The Degree programs are designed to meet the chal-

lenges of the new millennium in Social Science sectors in Pakistan.

Degree programs are of 2 years, 6 semesters, and cover 20 courses, Field Work Training and Research Thesis, all for 72 Credits. Generous fee concessions are available for merit/ deserving students. The Program has been made very Student Friendly; they join either Mon – Thu schedule or Fri – Sun schedule to suit their convenience.

The unique features of the program are: FAST TRACK PROGRAM: Covering 2 years degree in 1 year without compromising on quality and quantity of courses but taking double courses from Monday to Sunday.

Bi-Major: A student with Master in Social Sciences can do Bi-Major in Management Sciences or an MBA can do Bi-Major in Social Science in one year.



Each position had around three to four contenders.


