“I am proud to announce that Saawan has won Best Foreign Film Award at the 11th annual Alexandria Film Festival held in Virginia, US. Congratulation team Saawan on another win,” director Farhan Alam wrote on his Facebook page.

The movie has been well received and the Pakistani Academy Selection Committee nominating it for Oscar consideration in the Foreign Language Film Award category for the 2018 Academy Awards.

Saawan, directed by Farhan Alam and written and produced by Mashood Qadri, is based on a true story of a disabled child who lives in a valley

in the mountains of Balochistan. He is rejected by his father, intimidated by society, harassed by friends and left alone due to his disability.

Strengthened by memories and dreams of the love of his mother, he begins a perilous journey back to his family in the main city. The film features Saleem Mairaj, Syed Karam Abbas, Arif Bahalim, Najiba Faiz and Imran Aslam in the lead roles.

The other cast includes Tipu Sharif, Hafeez Ali, Sehrish Qadri, Sohail Malik, Shahid Niazmi, Muhammad Abbas, Daniaal Yunus, Mehek Zulfiqar and Syed Muhammad Ali. The film won ‘Best Foreign Language Feature Film’ award at the Madrid International Film Festival 2017 and the ‘Best Film’ and ‘Best Soundtrack Award’ at Salento Interna-

tional Film Festival in Italy earlier this year.

Edhi Foundation adds 100 ambulances to its fleet

The Edhi Foundation, a welfare organisation started by philanthropist Abdul Sattar Edhi, added 100 ambulances to its fleet on Sunday.

In a ceremony held at the Edhi Foundation office near Tower on Sunday, Faisal Edhi, the head of the foundation, handed the ambulances' keys over to the organisation's drivers. The ambulances will be used in the welfare organisation operations all over the country.

Currently, there is a fleet of 1,800 ambulances managed by the Edhi Foundation. It provides services across the country. However, according to Faisal, at least 400 ambulances in the fleet are worn out and

need to be replaced.

Faisal said the foundation wants to acquire 200 new ambulances in the coming year in order to maintain its fleet. He has also requested donations to achieve this target.

Faisal added that the addition of the new ambulances has been made keeping in mind the population explosion in the country. "We couldn't offer services during many bombings that took place recently in various parts of the country. Now, we can cater to more people," he said.

The newly-acquired ambulances will be used in Sukkur, Larkana, Shaheed Benazirabad, Hyder-



abad, Multan, Quetta, Peshawar, Lahore, Islamabad, Chitral and other parts of the northern areas of the country.

Out of the 100 ambulances, four were donated by a philanthropist, Faisal said, adding that the remaining vehicles were purchased by the Edhi Founda-

tion with the donations it collects.

The Edhi Foundation head also said that after 10 day emergency first responder training, the ambulances will be given support of on-board paramedic staff.

Balochistan to be purged of fatal diseases: minister

Provincial Health Minister Rehmat Saleh Baloch on Wednesday said that free-of-cost HIV/AIDS diagnostic centres had been set up in 28 districts of the province as part of Balochistan government's efforts to eliminate fatal diseases from the province.

Baloch said this while addressing a ceremony organised by the Balochistan AIDS Control Program and hosted by the Balochistan Boys Scouts Association in Quetta.

The minister also lashed out at previous governments, accusing them of failing to provide adequate health facilities to their



constituents. "When our government took the administrative rein of the province, we had to revamp issues that had existed for the past 40 years."

Baloch added that the poor law and order situation had kept donors and development workers away but "that is now changing".

'World's oldest' 48-foot long Buddha statue unearthed in Haripur district



A centuries-old 'sleeping Buddha' statue has been unearthed during excavations near Bhamala Stupa in Haripur district, Dawn-News reported on Thursday.

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Directorate of Archaeology and Museums Director Dr Abdul Samad said, "The 48-foot long 'sleeping Buddha' statue dates back to the third century, which makes it the world's oldest 'sleeping Buddha' statue."

He told DawnNews that archaeologists found the statue, with its head intact, during excavations

near the Bhamala Stupa.

"We have discovered more than 500 Buddha-related objects during excavations, in addition to the 48-foot long 'sleeping Buddha'," he said.

The latest discoveries by the archaeologists have opened new chapters in the history of the ancient Taxila Valley Civilisation. "This is one of the few sites in the world to have the cruciform Stupa, which was reserved for Buddha himself," Samad Said.

Pakistan climb to top spot in ICC T20 rankings

Pakistan's T20 team made history on Wednesday as it climbed to the number one spot in the International Cricket Council (ICC) T20 Rankings "for the first time ever", the cricket governing body announced.

Pakistan reached the top slot after India beat New Zealand in their latest Twenty20 tournament.

Former top T20 team, New Zealand lost to India by 53 runs in their first 20-overs game. India, who scored 202 runs for a loss of three wickets in the first innings, restricted NZ to 148-8.

New Zealand slipped down to number two spot, while India

It seems that Pakistan's triumphs in cricket are on a roll, as last month pacer Hasan Ali emerged as the top bowler in the ICC One Day International (ODI) rankings.

Last year, Pakistan reached the number 1 spot in ICC Test rankings under Misbahul Haq's captaincy, the second time in 28 years.

Pakistan Post issues commemorative stamps to honour Champions Trophy victory



Honouring the Pakistan's memorable victory in the International Cricket Council (ICC) Champions' Trophy in June, Pakistan Post has issued commemorative postage stamps and souvenir sheet.

Pakistan Post's Treasury Officer Karachi Tariq Awan said that 50,000 souvenir sheets and 300,000 stamps have been issued.

The stamps and souvenir sheets will be available at post offices across the country.

"The set of three stamps will cost Rs30, while the souvenir sheets are priced at Rs50 each," Awan said.

Pakistan had thrashed favourites India by 180 runs to clinch the Champions Trophy title in a thrilling competition at London's Oval ground.

The green shirts set up a daunting 339-run target with a loss of four wickets for the men in blue, but Indian batting collapsed under a calculated bowling attack, with all men out for just 158 runs in the 31st over.

The score is Pakistan's second-highest against India. The last time Pakistan beat India in an ICC event was in 2009 — also during a Champions Trophy match.

Construction of Layyah-Taunsa bridge okayed

The National Highway Authority (NHA) has approved the construction of a 1.75km, four-lane bridge across river Indus linking Layyah with Taunsa at a cost of around Rs2.6 billion.

The approval was granted on Wednesday in an Executive Board meeting of the Authority at the NHA headquarters. Chairman Shahid Ashraf Tarar chaired the meeting.

Sharing details of the project, Mr Tarar said the bridge would provide the much-needed connectivity because, at present, there was no river crossing over Indus to provide link between



the two cities. The two available links were D.I. Khan-Darya Bridge located 88km upstream of the proposed project site and Taunsa Barrage located 52km downstream of it. The city dwellers travel by road from Layyah to Taunsa or vice versa,

covering a distance of about 100km to reach either of the two cities. Alternatively, boat/ferry service was available from either side of the river to carry the residents across the river. The ferry service takes almost 1.25 hours to reach from

Layyah to Taunsa and vice versa.

The construction of the bridge would reduce the distance by up to 50km. Similarly, it would also facilitate traffic movement from east to west by providing link between Indus Highway (N-55) and Motorway M-4. The west bank of River Indus (Taunsa) would be connected with the provincial road network passing through the eastern side of the river through district Jhang, Faisalabad and Sheikhupura. The improved connectivity will uplift the socio-economic condition of these areas as well, the NHA chief said.
